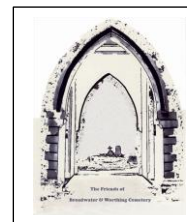

Looking forward to 2024

Welcome to your spring newsletter! We are already well into 2024 and a great deal of work has been done over the winter by our members.

Much time and effort has been spent, in sometimes inclement weather, tidying the cemetery. Mountains of bramble, ivy and other vegetation has been removed and headstones exposed. Needless to say, there is still much more to do, so if you have some time to spare...

The council's parks team has also been working in the cemetery recently and has made a real impact on several areas, cutting back trees and reinstating one of the grass paths. The plan is for this dedicated week of their time to become a regular winter event. They have also suggested that we may like to consider working for a Green Flag Award for the site. This is something I am keen to follow up, and so will be investigating the criteria needed for us to qualify. We will, of course, also need support from the council to achieve this.

Our research team has been putting in the hours to deliver another great tour season, making sure that we are ready for that first tour in April. (Hopefully the weather will be kind

to us on tour days!) We will have a Nature Tour again this year and, in June, as part of the Worthing Festival, we are planning a completely different type of tour: a "Dramatic Tour", with actors playing some of the roles. This is still very much in the early stages of creation, but we are working with Chris Hare on this. More details will follow over the next couple of months so look out for updates.

I'm looking forward to another positive year for the Friends and hope to see many of you at our various events throughout 2024.

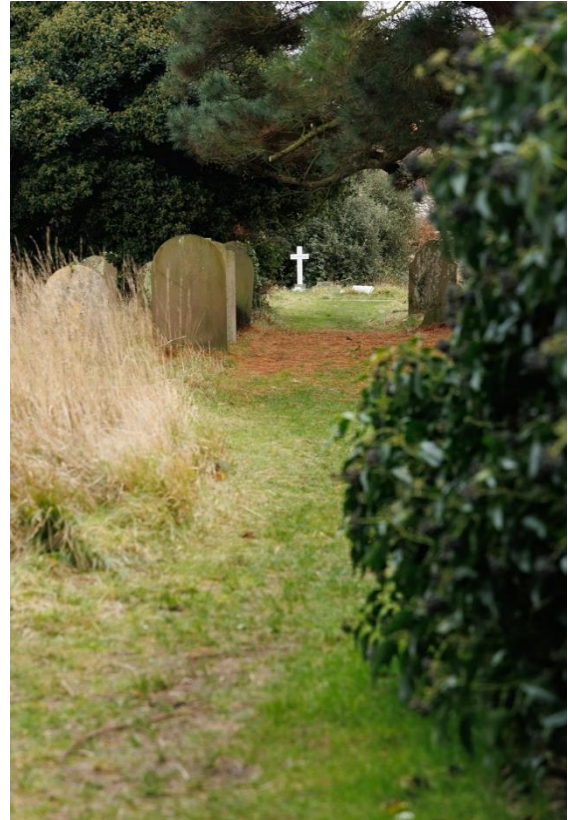
The hidden details of Broadwater Cemetery: my photographic journey (part three)

Clearance days at the cemetery went well last year, with lots of satisfying and productive work being undertaken by our regular volunteers. I thank them all for their continued interest and time.

Facebook is a useful resource for the cemetery. When we put photos of the cleared graves onto Facebook it generates 'likes', which keeps interest in the cemetery going – and, we hope, encourages new visitors to the cemetery.

To help support the cemetery's other visitors – its wildlife – some designated areas have been created. These areas, which were prepared by removing some rough couch grass to form a natural border, have been planted up with lavender and wildflowers to encourage the bees.



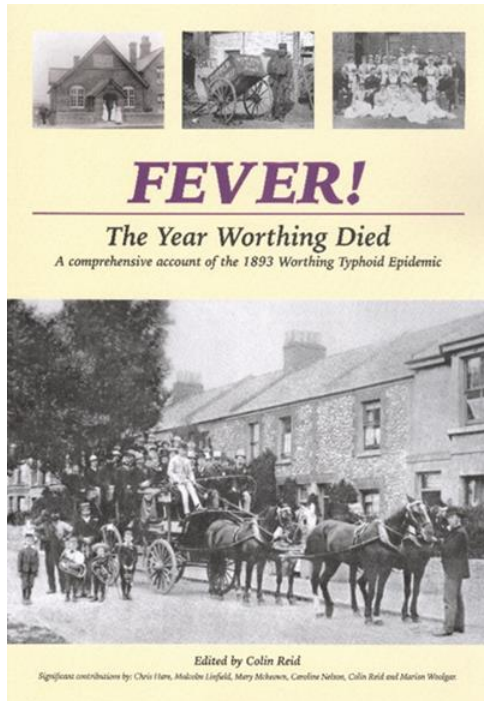

I have also collected and frozen some hawthorn berries, with a view to planting them during February/March. These areas will be maintained and should provide good winter food for the cemetery's birds (such as Thrushes).

Sussex Wildlife Trust have very kindly offered to come back to the cemetery in April for another Task Day. They will carry out some planting or light clearance work for us, which, as always, we very much appreciate.

Friends' publication update



The authors of *FEVER! The Year Worthing Died* have been taking every opportunity to promote this comprehensive account of the 1893 Worthing typhoid epidemic that resulted in the unnecessary deaths of at least 194 people of all ages and backgrounds. Before the book was published, Malcolm Linfield and Colin Reid made a Powerpoint presentation to a local history group (Surfleet) that meets in East Worthing Community Centre monthly and Mary Mckeown was on hand to take future book orders. Then, in January, the same dynamic duo made a similar presentation to the Worthing meeting of the Sussex Family History Group that meets in Field Place. On Thursday 14th March, Chris Hare, Malcolm Linfield and Colin Reid (with an introduction by Debra Hillman) made a presentation to an audience

of more than 80 at Offington Park Methodist Church. There was a Question & Answers session hosted by five of the authors including Caroline Nelson. Paul Robards assisted with checking tickets whilst Mary Mckeown and Gill Heasman sold a further 23 copies of the book that has been very well-received.

For the future, Colin has agreed to make a Web Talk for the Sussex Family History Group on Thursday 25th April and there are possible openings with the West Sussex Writers' group in October and the Billingshurst Literary Festival.

Advertising in the *Inside* group of newspapers, *Worthing Herald* and *The Worthing Journal* have also contributed to book sales.
